



Eagle Mountain - Woodfibre Gas Pipeline project



About the project

As a utility, meeting the energy needs of our customers is what FortisBC does every day. That's why, when our customer Woodfibre LNG asked us if we could deliver natural gas to them, we began to explore how and proposed the Eagle Mountain - Woodfibre Gas Pipeline (EGP) project.

The project will expand a portion of our existing natural gas transmission system, which was built in 1991 to serve Squamish, the Sunshine Coast and Vancouver Island. It involves adding about 50 kilometres of new 24-inch pipe between Coguitlam and the Woodfibre LNG site in Squamish, including three kilometres near Westwood Plateau in Coguitlam.

We have worked closely with the Squamish and Coquitlam communities for many years, and will continue to engage local residents, key stakeholders, and Indigenous communities as the project progresses.

We anticipate construction to take place between 2023 and 2025.



Environmental Assessment Process

In 2016, the project was approved by $S\underline{k}w\underline{x}w\dot{u}7mesh~\dot{U}xwumixw$ (Squamish Nation) as part of an Environmental Assessment Agreement with FortisBC, which is the first of its kind in Canada. The provincial government also provided us with an Environmental Assessment Certificate (EAC).

After further project review and local engagement, we applied to make changes that would incorporate feedback and technical advancements, such as moving the proposed Squamish Compressor Station to the Woodfibre LNG site. These changes were approved by the EAO in late 2021 and by Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw in early 2022.
